1:00-3:15 pm Using Your Strengths, the Strengths of Others, and the "Four Frames" to Lead Strategically

Facilitator: Justin Sipher, Principal, Justin Sipher Consulting, LLC Effective academic leadership requires a dynamic blend of self-awareness, collaboration, and strategic adaptability. In this session, participants will integrate insights from their CliftonStrengths assessment with Lee Bolman and Terry Deal's Four-Frames Model. This will help fellows understand their leadership instincts better and enhance their effectiveness to lead organizational change. Through interactive discussions participants will explore how to:

- *Leverage their personal strengths in leadership contexts.*
- *Recognize and activate the strengths of colleagues.*
- *Apply the Four-Frames Model to assist in leading institutional changes.*

In small groups, participants will analyze leadership challenges being faced, identifying strategies that align personal strengths, organizational perspectives, and collaborative leadership to achieve effective outcomes. *There will be a 15 min. bio break taken at the speaker's discretion
